Dear Parents and Guardians,

As you will have seen in the press, there are isolated cases of the swine flu virus within the UK.

The World Health Organisation has upgraded the threat of declaring that the world is experiencing an influenza pandemic and the UK Government have been planning for this occurrence. We have been working closely with both the Local Authority and Cognita to be prepared for any local impact.

Within all Southbank campuses, we will be increasing cleaning regimes and practising infection control measures. We will be encouraging students and staff to:

- Wash their hands using soap and water on a regular basis throughout the day
- Cover their mouth when coughing or sneezing using tissues provided around the school
- Throw away dirty tissues quickly into bins provided around the school

We would strongly recommend that you consider this advice and continue these practices with your children when they are at home.

Should the situation change in London, it may be necessary to close schools within the area to stop the virus spreading amongst children or if too many staff become ill with the virus themselves. Please ensure that the campus office has your up-to-date emergency contact details so that we can contact you if we have to close the school.

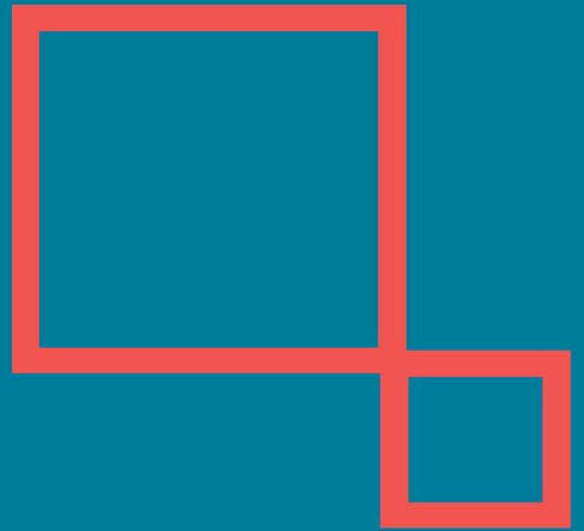

Planning for a human influenza pandemic

Information for parents from the Department
for Education and Skills

Every Child Matters
Change For Children

Experts advise that a flu pandemic is inevitable, but cannot say when it will happen. All government departments are planning ahead, and advising businesses and organisations to plan and be ready. We have prepared this short note for parents and carers as part of a package of guidance to local authorities, schools, colleges and children’s services. The publication of this information does not mean that the probability of a pandemic has changed.

What is pandemic flu?

Pandemic flu is a type of influenza that occurs every few decades and which spreads rapidly to affect most countries and regions around the world. The symptoms of pandemic flu are similar to those of ‘ordinary’ flu but are usually more severe.

What you should do now

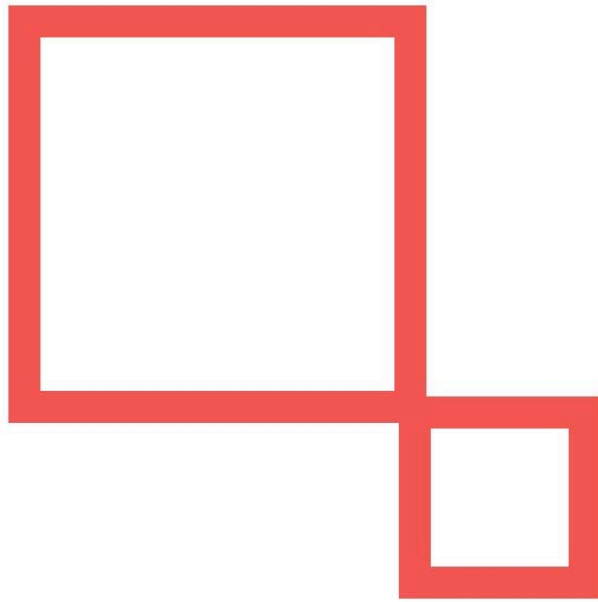
Help your child’s childminder, nursery, pre-school group, school or other educational institution by making sure they have up to date contact details for you: your address, telephone numbers (home, work and mobile) and e-mail as appropriate. They will want to pass on advice when a pandemic is on its way and after it arrives.

Teach and encourage your children to:

- . ■ wash their hands using soap and water
- . ■ cover their mouth when coughing or sneezing – using a tissue is good
- . ■ throw dirty tissues away quickly into bins

These simple actions are the sort of thing that every child should do, even in ordinary times, but they will also help to slow the spread of a pandemic.

When a pandemic happens, we will make sure that messages from the Department of Health are passed to schools and childcare settings, through local authorities.



As ever, the school or childcare setting will advise you of any actions that it needs to take to protect children's health and well-being.

What may happen if a pandemic arrives in the UK?

During a pandemic, most services will try to maintain normal services. However, it is possible that some schools or services such as childcare may be advised to close to stop the virus spreading between children; or some may need to close because of staff being off work ill.

If this happens, you will get information from the school, nursery or childcare provider if they are closing, and they would also contact you to advise you of their re-opening.

If your child is at school, and the school remains open, your normal duty to send your child to school still applies. If your child shows any signs of flu-like illness, keep them at home and inform the school.

During the pandemic the school may need to contact you at short notice, for example if your child falls sick during the day. This is why it is so important that your contact details, for you and any one else who looks after your child, are kept up to date.

Other services may be affected, such as the school meals service. The school

should advise you of any alternative arrangements it has to make in these circumstances.
